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INTRODUCTION

This is a funny rhyming picture book with bright and engaging illustrations that teaches children about animals who look similar, but have unique differences, from acclaimed author Ashleigh Barton and illustrator Amandine Thomas.

When a hedgehog and an echidna meet and realise they have many similarities, they take a look at other animal pairs around the world who look the same but aren't: crocodiles and alligators, llamas and alpacas, rabbits and hares, and more. Join Echidna and Hedgehog as they meet animals who look similar to one another – and learn to tell the difference between them!

Written by popular children's author Ashleigh Barton, with vibrant and expressive watercolour illustrations by fine artist Amandine Thomas, this is a book that is bound to entertain young readers as it also enhances their knowledge of wildlife.

THEMES & CURRICULUM TOPICS

ANIMAL SIMILARITIES

Discussion Point: Study any of the pairs (or in some cases, three or more animals that are alike) in this book and make a list of other facts about them that make them similar or different. [See also **Worksheet 3**.]

Activity: A raven, a jackdaw, a magpie, a rook and a crow are all featured on a double page spread. Invite students to create a fact chart listing some of the distinguishing features of each bird. [See **Worksheet 2**.]

Discussion Point: Research other animals that are often mistaken for each other, for example pangolins and armadillos, manatees and dugongs, donkeys and mules, or hornbills and toucans.

ANIMAL CHARACTERISTICS

Discussion Point: In each of the spreads in this book, students will observe various animal characteristics such as beaks, tails, etc, that define the nature of that animal. Discuss the different varieties of physical features that you can identify in any specific animal not identified in this book; for example, armadillos have a leathery armoured shell and long, sharp claws for digging.

Activity: Read other picture books to explore these animal features, for example, Narelle Oliver's *The Best Beak in Boonaroo Bay* (1995) or Darrin Lunde's *Whose Footprint is That?* (2019).



ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERACY

The text of this book might be studied in relation to the following aspects:

Activity: This is a rhyming text, eg. 'I'm bigger and older. I live where it's colder.' Discuss rhyming with students and invite them to practise rhyming a few simple words, coming up with alternative options for each word, for example, fair/lair, more/core, read/head.

Activity: Invite students to write a simple text describing two other animals that are often mistaken for each other. Then employ rhyme to make the text more enticing.

Activity: Test your students' **comprehension** by asking them questions about the various animals featured in the written and visual text. What distinguishes each of the animals from another that is similar?

VISUAL LITERACY

The visual text of a book combines with the written text to tell the story using the various parts of the book's design and illustrations, as explored below:

Activity: The **cover** of this book depicts the hedgehog and echidna frolicking on the back cover, and back to back looking quizzical on the front cover. These amusing images are enticing for a young reader. There is also poetic license used in that the two animals actually live in very different countries and would not generally meet at all! Invite students to look closely at the cover after reading the book, and then to design a new cover.

Activity: The **endpapers** depict the echidna on the front, and the hedgehog on the back, in rows of identical animals. Design your own endpapers featuring another animal pair and work on a similar grid. [See also **Worksheet 5**. **Q. 8., 9., and 10**. for added comments on the endpapers.]

Discussion Point: The **title page** repeats the cover image of the two animals playing together. Subsequent pages identify different pairs of similar and yet different animals. On nearly every double-page spread the pairs of animals are facing each other. How does the **layout and design of each spread in this storyboard** influence your reading of it?

Activity: These animal characters are given **facial expressions and body language** that indicates a mood or feeling, for example, the Sea Lion looks haughty with nose in the air, and the seven Seals in this picture each have different expressions. The Tuatara looks fierce and the Lizards look playful. Encourage students when drawing an animal to give it a facial expression indicating its feelings.

Activity: The **medium or style** employed is watercolour, in **colours** which are strong and vibrant. See on Amandine Thomas's website: 'My Top Five Drawing Exercises for Inspiration' *Amandine Thomas*

Activity: Invite students to draw, paint, or collage another scene to accompany the short text they wrote above. Create a classroom mural using all the images. [See also **Worksheet 1** below.]

Activity: Create a graphic novel/comic version of a scene in this book. [See **Bibliography**.] [See also **Worksheet 4**.]



CREATIVE ARTS

There are many creative activities suggested by this text:

- **1. Make a play-doh hedgehog or echidna.** Invite students to mould the shape they want and then use toothpicks as the animal's quills. They could also add plastic eyes if they have them in their craft box.
- 2. Create a diorama of one of the animals in this book in its habitat or environment.
- **3. Create an animal mask from a paper plate.** Choose any of the animals featured in this book, and then cut out and glue pieces onto the plate to indicate the face of that animal. Colour in or collage the plate to create a vivid effect. Then add elastic to the sides in order to secure it to your head. - 4. Create a poster to advertise this book.
- 5. Create a Book Trailer to promote this book. [See Bibliography.]

LEARNING TECHNOLOGIES

Activity: Research online several animals and the features that distinguish them from each other

MATHEMATICS

Activity: Have fun counting things in this text. [See Worksheet 5.]

FURTHER TOPICS FOR DISCUSSION AND RESEARCH

- Research the work of Ashleigh Barton. Compare this to her other books.
- Research the work of Amandine Thomas. Compare this to her other books.
- Students might research this book in comparison to reading other picture books such as those listed in the **Bibliography**.
- Investigate any other topic not covered in these notes which you consider is suggested by this text.

CONCLUSION

This is a fascinating book that will lead students to researching a range of animals and to discovering what makes seemingly similar animals very different from each other. It will also encourage them to observe animal features more closely, and to recognise the distinctive features of each and every animal.



AUTHOR'S NOTES

This book came about after a debate with my two-year-old regarding an image of an alligator on an alphabet toy. Not yet able to read or understand what letters mean, he insisted that the animal was a crocodile and would not accept that it was, in fact, an alligator despite it representing the letter "A". This got me thinking about all the different animals around the world that are easily mixed up or are at least appear very similar.

I set out researching similar animals and had so much fun creating rhyming verses that incorporated some of their differences. I chose rhyme, as opposed to prose, to help create a fun and playful tone that played on each animal's indignation and pride of their unique characteristics. Of course, there are many animal pairs or groups that didn't make it into the confines of a picture book but perhaps readers will have run researching and writing rhyming verses about the missing ones too.

ILLUSTRATOR'S NOTES

Nature and animals are some of my favourite themes to work on, so I was immediately inspired by this book. The evocative and lively text was very fun to work with, and sparked images in my mind as soon as I read it... Which is the starting point of all my illustrations! Once I had an idea for each page, I worked on the overall rhythm of the book: I didn't want the images to feel repetitive, so I made sure to vary the perspective, the colours, and the scale of the illustration.

Each page was created using my favourite technique, watercolour. However, I love to paint on unconventional surfaces, like tracing paper, and use atypical tools, like a sergent major nib, to bring a modern twist to my illustrations! I also paint each element separately, before scanning them and assembling them like a collage in Photoshop, my favourite image-editing software.

The best part of working on this book was giving each character their own personality, while making sure to highlight their unique features (like the shape of their beaks, paws, or scales). I also really enjoyed depicting the playful relationship between Hedgehog and Echidna, from wary strangers to fast friends. I think they are the cutest pair!

Ashleigh Barton is a children's author and copywriter. Before writing full time, she pursued her love of books (children's books especially) by working in some of Australia's biggest publishing houses, running marketing and publicity campaigns for globally renowned authors and illustrators. 
ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR






WORKSHEET 2. BIRD RESEARCH


